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The Fellowship of Postgraduate Medicine was founded by a group of London consultants after the First World War to assist postgraduates, particularly those coming to London from the Commonwealth,

to pursue their studies. The Fellowship first published the *Postgraduate Medical Journal* to give information about lectures, conferences and courses and to provide a monthly review of all branches of medicine.

Postgraduate Medical Journal publishes original papers on subjects of current clinical importance and welcomes review articles with extensive, up-to-date bibliographies as guides to further reading. Several symposia are published each year, each devoted to a single subject and written by specialists in different disciplines. Most issues include authoritative Current Surveys of clinical problems, and well documented Reports of cases of particular interest, and Book Reviews.

Book reviews

Davidson's Principles and Practice of Medicine (12th Edition).

Edited by JOHN MACLEOD. Pp. 978, illustrated. Churchill Livingstone, Edinburgh, London and New York, 1978. Soft cover £6.50; cased £10.00.

Davidson has justifiably become a classic in the quarter century since it first appeared. Although one has wondered whether the pace of advances in medicine really justified a new edition every 2 years, it is a pleasure to welcome the twelfth. The major change has been the incorporation of the previously separate *Tropical Diseases Supplement* into a single book. The result is that this section forms one eighth of the text and one has the apparent anomaly of yaws getting as much space as the irritable bowel syndrome. This is, probably, the ultimate benefit of the large number of readers of Davidson in those parts of the world consuming a high-residue diet.

The quality of the print and paper is not as good as that of the previous edition but the book is of a smaller size, thanks to the removal of dated contents and in spite of new material. The chapters on genetics, the cardiovascular system, liver and psychiatry show the biggest changes.

The editor's objective in providing a rational and comprehensible basis for the practice of medicine suitable for undergraduate and postgraduate students has been amply achieved.

Diagnostic E.N.T.

By G. D. L. SMYTH. Pp. 130, illustrated. Oxford University Press, Oxford, 1978. Paper back. £3.00.

This is an excellent new textbook for medical students but it contains, in my view, one most serious fault.

This short book is designed for undergraduate students and also, the cover says, to be helpful to ENT registrars. It is most clearly written by an acknowledged leader in the speciality and the 37 line illustrations – there could have been more in a book on a subject so dependent on visual observation – are models other authors would do well to follow. The short summaries or revision paragraphs at the end of each chapter will be especially helpful just before examinations.

The book, however, has been written to 'do away with the mystique of the laryngeal mirror'. Diagnosis of diseases of the larynx and pharynx is described without recourse to indirect laryngoscopy or its possible findings; all cases of laryngeal disease and many of pharyngeal disease are to be referred to an ENT Clinic. The technique (not mystique) of indirect laryngoscopy using a mirror is and has been acquired by many doctors other than ENT surgeons, no laryngeal diagnosis is possible otherwise and many if not most teachers of ENT feel that the mirror should not be the sole province of

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Standard usage. The *Concise Oxford English Dictionary* is used as a reference for all spelling and hyphenation. Verbs which contain the suffix *ize* (*ise*) and their derivatives should be spelt with the *z*. Statistics and measurements should always be given in figures, i.e. 10 min, 20 hr, 5 ml, except where the number begins the sentence. When the number does *not* refer to a unit of measurement, it is spelt out except where the number is greater than one hundred. SI units should be used wherever possible. Papers should be written in the third person.

Figures. In the text Arabic numbers, e.g. Fig. 3, should be used. They should be marked on the backs with the name(s) of the author(s) and the title of the paper. The top of each figure should be indicated with an arrow on the reverse side. Each figure must bear a reference corresponding to a similar number in the text. Photographs and photomicrographs should be unmounted glossy prints and should not be retouched. Line diagrams should be on separate sheets; they should be drawn with black Indian ink on white paper and should be twice the size of the final reproduction. The originals of line diagrams, prepared as described above, may be submitted in photographs of similar size. The legends of all figures should be typed together on a single sheet of paper headed 'Captions to Figures'.

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
