

Editorial Notes.

Co-operation in Post-Graduate Study.

For the success of Post-Graduate Study it would seem quite unnecessary to remark that there must be perfect co-operation between the student and the teacher. Nevertheless, this is an aspect of the problem which cannot be sufficiently stressed because it is so frequently, although often quite innocently we admit, forgotten. The onus for the success of any individual course does not rest alone with the man who is arranging it but is equally shared by the man for whom it is provided. In short there can be no teacher if there is no pupil.

It should also be unnecessary to point out that in the preparation of any individual course much time and labour are expended by the teacher in his endeavour to provide the best that lies within his power for the student. Indeed, the student would have just cause for complaint if this were not so. Let the student dismiss from his mind at once any idea that all the sacrifice on the part of the teacher is the time entailed in going to, delivering and returning from the lecture. And in this reckoning of the cost we have not referred to the secretarial work of the office in advertising, etc., and the inconvenience of patients attending for the purpose of demonstration.

From time to time the Fellowship of Medicine arranges special courses comprising a series of meetings and for which they appreciate there cannot be a wide appeal. These are of the nature of advanced teaching designed for specialists. They are the highest form of post-graduate study and require very special preparation. On other occasions, in order that the teaching may be intimate and conform to the much desired tutorial system, the numbers permitted to attend are strictly limited. In return for these privileges applications are requested by a certain specified date so that in case of an insufficiency of entries the course may be abandoned and those responsible for its conduct relieved so far as is possible of the labour of unnecessary preparation.

In view of the above considerations it is surely not too much to ask that prospective students should give notice before the specified date of their intention to attend and thus provide that co-operation between teacher and taught which is so essential for the success of any effort to provide facilities for him who has mayhap come thousands of miles to prosecute his studies. There is certainly little call for sympathy for the man who has omitted to do this and who, unannounced, turns up at the lecture to find that it has been cancelled.

Debate on Gastric and Duodenal Ulcers.

The Fellowship of Medicine has arranged a debate on the motion "That in the absence of complications surgical interference in cases of gastric and duodenal ulcer is unnecessary", with Lord Moynihan in the chair. The place of meeting is the **Lecture Hall of the Royal Society of Tropical Medicine, Portland Place**, and the time, **Wednesday, 30th May, at 8.30 p.m.** The motion will be proposed by Dr. A. F. Hurst and seconded by Mr. Mortimer Woolf, while Dr. Robert Hutchison, with the support of Mr. Herbert Paterson, will move its rejection. We hope, as was done in the case of the "**Tonsillectomy Debate**" to publish a verbatim report of the discussion in the Journal.

Concerning the interest and success of the various debates which have been conducted under the auspices of the Fellowship there is no question, and of their value there can be no doubt. In no other way can, we think, the subject under discussion be presented from so many angles, the reason for the faith that is within a man be so readily assessed and the important from the unimportant be so satisfactorily differentiated. And to those members who are visiting the metropolis for a period of study these debates must have a special interest, as well as a considerable educative value, in that they provide an opportunity of hearing at first hand the views of many of the leaders in the profession.

Special Evening Course on Thoracic Disease.

We would like to draw the attention of our readers to a series of evening lectures in which an attempt is made to give a comprehensive review of one branch of medicine, and specially designed for the general practitioner. This is the course on the *diagnosis and treatment of chronic diseases of the chest* by Dr. Philip Ellman at the Rooms of the Medical Society of London from the 11th to 27th April. Free Afternoon Lectures.

The Fellowship of Medicine has also arranged three free afternoon lectures at the Medical Society of London, Chandos Street, on April 19th, when the subject is "Vision and Colour Vision"; on April 26th the topic being "Septic Tonsils; Naso-Pharyngitis and its Results"; and on May 3rd, when the question of "The Sebaceous Glands in relation to Rheumatism in Childhood and after Puberty" will be discussed.
