considerable number of patients in whom clinical changes are not obvious. In these cases appropriate neurosurgery, from alcohol injection to section, is of considerable value. Such measures are held also to be a valuable adjunct to general pelvic surgery in the eradication of long-standing and previously intractable pain.

MALIGNANT DISEASE AND ITS TREATMENT BY RADIUM

VOLUME II

By SIR STANFORD CADE, K.B.E., C.B., F.R.C.S., M.R.C.P. 2nd Edition. Pp. xi + 430 with 205 illustrations, many in colour. Bristol: John Wright & Sons. 1949. 52s. 6d.

The second volume of Sir Stanford Cade's monumental work on *Malignant Disease and its Treatment by Radium* has now appeared. Again John Wright & Sons are to be congratulated on the paper, print and illustrations.

This volume deals with malignant disease of the mouth, pharynx, larynx, and neck, a region in which Sir Stanford Cade perhaps reaches his highest eminence, and one in which radiotherapy has perhaps its greatest scope. Carcinoma of the lip is very fully dealt with, and carcinoma of the tongue is considered in equal detail. Some radiotherapists might suggest that Sir Stanford Cade's therapeutic advice is a little over-weighted in the

direction of interstitial radium needling, but certainly in his hands this form of therapy is highly effective, and his practice of methods which call for a very high standard of radiation dosage and of surgical technique is masterly. To the advocates of other forms of radiation therapy, it might be pointed out that, after all, the title of the book is *Malignant Disease and its Treatment by Radium*. A valuable chapter on the treatment of metastases in cervical lymph glands includes a careful consideration of block dissection.

Tumours of the tonsil, pharynx and larynx receive a very full consideration which will be of particular interest to the laryngologist. The chapter on malignant disease of the thyroid gland is a brilliant little essay.

Sir Stanford Cade is so persuasive an advocate that it is natural that in some places recommendations for treatment are heavily weighted by personal opinion, but that opinion is in its turn based on so wide an experience, and the author has so judiciously weighed all available forms of therapy that criticism or contradiction of the methods advised for individual tumours would be impertinent. It should be stated that alternative methods of treatment receive sufficiently liberal consideration for this volume, like its predecessor, to be regarded as the best available authority on the radium treatment of malignant disease, and on related surgical problems. The book is a magnificent personal triumph for its author.
