POST-GRADUATE NEWS.

OWING to the Easter vacation, it is not practicable to begin Special Courses until towards the end of the month.

From April 28 to May 24 a Special Course in Laryngology, Rhinology and Otology, including Operative Surgery Class, a Practical Course in Peroral Endoscopy, and a Course in Pathology and Bacteriology (especially suitable for D.L.O. candidates), will be given at the Central London Throat, Nose and Ear Hospital, Gray's Inn Road, W.C. 1. Tickets of admission and copies of syllabus are obtainable from the Fellowship of Medicine. Early application is advisable for some of the classes, as numbers are limited.

The fees are as follows: Clinical Course (i.e., lectures and attendance at Clinics and Operations), £5 5s.; Operative Surgery Class (*number limited*), £7 7s.; Peroral Endoscopy Class (*number strictly limited*), £6 6s.; Pathology Class (*number limited*), £5 5s.

On April 7, 9, 14, 16, 23 and 25 inclusive a course in Methods of Examination and Diagnosis will be held at the above-mentioned hospital at 1.30 p.m. Post-graduates are advised to take this course preparatory to the intensive course, but it is entirely optional. Fee £1 1s.; tickets from Fellowship of Medicine.

From April 28 to May 10 an afternoon course will be given at the Infants Hospital, Vincent Square, S.W. 1, under the direction of Dr. Eric Pritchard. This course en-

deavours to cover all phases of diseases of infants which might be required by the medical officers of welfare centres and others. Interesting visits are made to other centres apart from the clinics held at the hospital. Fee £3 3s.

Also beginning on April 28 and continuing until May 30 a post-graduate course in Psychological Medicine will take place at the Maudsley Hospital, Denmark Hill, S.E. 5. This course will consist of a series of lectures on the Psychoneuroses, The Pathology of Mental Diseases, Crime and Insanity, Legal Relationships of Insanity and Treatment, and Abnormalities of the Fundus Oculi. Demonstrations will be given on Pathology of the Central Nervous System, Clinical Psychiatry, Clinical Neurology, and Clinical Laboratory Methods. There are various forms of Clinical Instruction at the hospital, which will be open during the period of the course to those attending it. Fee £5 5s.

Readers are asked to refer to the Editorial concerning the M.R.C.P. Special Course which will be held from May 13 to July 4, inclusive.

Detailed syllabuses can be forwarded at any time. If the up-to-date programmes are not available, specimen copies showing the ground covered by the courses can be supplied.

The Fellowship of Medicine does not resume its weekly free clinical demonstrations in medicine and surgery until May. Programmes will be forwarded on request. No formal lectures are arranged by the Fellowship of Medicine during the summer months.

THE HOSPITAL FOR SICK CHILDREN, GREAT ORMOND ST., W.C.1.

This Hospital contains 252 beds, with an average admission of 5,000 in-patients per annum; whilst in the out-patient Department about 25,000 new patients are seen each year. The Medical School is recognised by the Universities of Oxford, Cambridge, and London, and by the Conjoint Medical Board of England, as a teaching institution where two months' clerking and dressing may be carried out by any undergraduate student who is entering for a final qualifying examination. In addition, for students who have completed four years of medical study, six months of the fifth year may be spent there in clinical work under recognition from the Conjoint Board. Post-graduate instruction, open to all qualified medical men and women, is given daily in the wards, out-patient department, operating theatre, and *post-mortem* room by members of the visiting staff. In addition, lectures are arranged for them throughout the year, announcements of which are made from time to time, and full details of them can be obtained from the Dean or Secretary at the Hospital. Clinical clerkship in the wards and clinical assistantships in the out-patient department are also available for post-graduate students. Opportunities for study are also offered in the Ophthalmic, Dermatological, Dental, Radiographic, and Pathological Departments.

Fees for Hospital Attendances. One Month's Ticket, £2 2s. Three Months' Ticket, £5 5s. Perpetual Ticket, £10 10s. Special reduced fees for Clinical Clerks, Dressers for one month's attendance, £1 1s. Clerks attend for about four hours daily.

Pathological Department. Facilities are afforded to post-graduates for obtaining theoretical and practical instruction in Clinical Pathology and Bacteriology, and in Medical Biochemistry in the Pathological and Biochemical Laboratories.

Courses of 8 to 10 Lecture Demonstrations are given at weekly intervals twice a year in both subjects (Clinical Pathology and Bacteriology and Biochemistry). These Lecture Demonstrations are of one or two hours' duration.
