

the very extensive experiences and reflections of the author himself; the diversity and insidious character of the initial symptoms are emphasized and a series of case records is appended in illustration of the clinical features and course taken by the disease together with their several autopsy findings. We are particularly interested to note Dr. Davidson's attitude in regard to the development of radiology and its application in the diagnosis of diseases of the chest during recent years; although he is inclined to think that neoplasm of the lung or bronchus cannot as a rule be diagnosed solely on radiological evidence, he nevertheless emphasizes the very valuable assistance which X-ray examination provides, and pleads for a closer co-operation between the clinician and the radiologist in all cases.

The classification of the different radiological types of lung cancer is that originally suggested by Dr. Stanley Melville, and we feel that the author could not have chosen a more simple and practical method of grouping; the section is amply illustrated by well-chosen skiagrams, and these, equally

with the diagrams, photomicrographs, &c., elsewhere in the text, have been reproduced with the care and excellent technique for which the publishers are already so well known.

The latter portion of the book includes a chapter on diagnosis in which the author epitomizes modern methods of investigation, the scope of their utility and their practical application.

The final chapter deals with the question of treatment and, although Dr. Davidson regards lung cancer as one of those diseases in which therapeutics have signally failed to keep pace with the advances of pathology, he lays particular stress on the progress which intrathoracic surgery has made during the last few years and the possibilities offered by suitable treatment with radium.

We regard the book as a valuable contribution to the literature, and we are pleased to take this opportunity of congratulating the author and the publishers on the production of what we predict will be accepted as a standard work.

THE Fellowship of Medicine and Post-Graduate Medical Association, with which some 50 London general and special hospitals are connected, exists for the arrangement of post-graduate instruction for medical men and women of all nationalities.

The Medical Year begins in October and finishes at the end of the following July. August and September are vacation months, and the work obtainable is necessarily somewhat curtailed. Overseas doctors should, if possible, arrive in England in August or September so that they may become acquainted with London and plan their course of study well before the Medical Year begins.

The following facilities are offered by the Fellowship of Medicine :

1. **GENERAL COURSE**, consisting of attendance at the clinical practice of the associated London hospitals. The General Course continues throughout the year, and may be begun at any time, the fees ranging from £2 2s. od. for one week to £21 for one year.
2. **SPECIAL COURSES**. A year's programme is arranged in advance (see overleaf for provisional List for 1931). The following points should be noted :
 - (a) Early application **MUST** be made for "Limited" Courses; also for Courses which have a "Minimum" condition attached to them, to avoid cancellation of the Course.
 - (b) Dates, Times, and Fees of all Courses are subject to alteration, if necessary.
 - (c) A detailed syllabus of each Course is obtainable about one month before the Course begins. Specimen syllabuses can be obtained at any time on application.
3. **LECTURES AND DEMONSTRATIONS**. Weekly lectures (during the winter months) and weekly demonstrations (except during August and September) are arranged. No fee is charged for attendance, and the programmes are prepared for three months at a time.
4. **DEGREES AND DIPLOMAS**. Information can be provided as follows :
 - (a) Regulations for and dates of examinations for degrees and diplomas.
 - (b) Facilities in London for special courses of instruction for degrees and diplomas.
5. **RESIDENT APPOINTMENTS**. Information can be provided regarding the dates, duration, and opportunities for securing resident appointments in London Hospitals. The majority of appointments are tenable for six months, and renewable for a further six months, so that usually candidates are appointed who can give twelve months service.
6. **"POST-GRADUATE MEDICAL JOURNAL."** This Journal is published monthly and contains post-graduate lectures, clinical demonstrations, reviews of books, post-graduate news, &c. Annual subscription 6s. per annum, post free.
7. **MEMBERSHIP OF THE FELLOWSHIP OF MEDICINE** is open to all qualified men and women. Annual subscription is 10s., which includes subscription to the *Post-Graduate Medical Journal*, and copies of monthly Special Announcements sheet and all syllabuses.
8. **CENTRAL INFORMATION BUREAU**. The Fellowship of Medicine will assist medical practitioners requiring advice and help in post-graduate study, living accommodation, travelling in London, &c. No charge is made for this service.

The course will be of a comprehensive character and will permit post-graduates to attend throughout at the practice of the hospital, but definite teaching will only be given at specific times. Fee four guineas.

A post-graduate course in Radium Therapy will be held at the General Hospital, Birmingham, from September 22nd to October 4th, 1930. Members of the medical profession desiring to attend should notify the Dean of the Faculty of Medicine, the University, Edmund Street, Birmingham, not later than September 8th. The fee for the course is £5 5s.

POST-GRADUATE NEWS.

From September onwards the Fellowship of Medicine and Post-Graduate Medical Association has arranged a varied choice of Special Courses. Particulars of these can be obtained from the Secretary of the Fellowship, at 1, Wimpole Street, London, W.1, who will supply copies of the detailed syllabuses on application. Taking the September courses, a few remarks concerning each will perhaps be helpful to those wishing to do some post-graduate study.

From September 1st to September 13th the Queen's Hospital for Children will provide an all-day course. The chief feature at this hospital being the showing of cases rather than the giving of formal lectures. There is an abundance of clinical, medical and surgical material as there are nearly 200 out-patients daily. A simple lunch and tea is kindly provided by the hospital authorities. Fee £2 12s. 6d.

For the panel practitioner and others desirous of "brushing-up" their knowledge of medicine and surgery the Westminster Hospital will undertake an intensive course from September 15th to September 27th. The sessions are from 10.30 a.m. to 5.30 p.m. each day (Saturdays from 10.30 to 1.0 p.m.) and the work provided will include instruction in general medicine, surgery, ophthalmology, laryngology, etc. A visit will be made to two mental institutions connected with the hospital, on each of the two Saturdays. Fee £5 5s. or £3 3s. for either week.

FORTHCOMING EVENTS.

From September 29th to October 11th there will be an all-day course in medicine

and surgery at the Metropolitan Hospital. Fee £3 3s. This course will be on similar lines to that undertaken by the staff of the Westminster Hospital, and further notice thereof will be made in the September issue of the Journal.

From October 7th to December 2nd an evening M.R.C.P. Special Course will be arranged by the Fellowship of Medicine consisting of two lectures weekly on Tuesdays and Fridays at 8.30 p.m. In all there will be 17 lectures (including one on Medical Ophthalmology) and two demonstrations of the Fundus Oculi. The fee is 10s. 6d. per lecture or £6 6s. for the series, and 10s. 6d. extra each demonstration.

The Fellowship of Medicine will be holding its first Final Fellowship Course which will consist of six classes in clinical surgery and pathology on the following dates:—October 8th, 17th, 22nd, 29th, November 5th and 12th. Time 8.30 p.m.

These two courses are of special interest to those who have but the evening at their disposal for study for the higher examinations.

For the benefit of our readers we would say that there is a Primary F.R.C.S. Course in Anatomy and Physiology in preparation for the December Examination taking place from September 2nd at King's College, Strand. The fee for the course is 20 guineas.

We understand that the Brompton Hospital Medical Committee have recently decided to alter the arrangements obtaining in regard to post-graduate instruction. The new scheme, which it is hoped, will come into force in October, is intended to replace the existing one by providing systematic
