

POST-GRADUATE NEWS.

AN intensive course in Cardiology will be held at the National Hospital for Diseases of the Heart, from January 12 to January 24. Early application is desirable for this course in view of its great popularity and the entry being limited to twenty. The fee for the course is £7 7s.

The Staff of the North East London Post-Graduate College (Prince of Wales's Hospital), Tottenham, will undertake an all-day course from January 26 to February 7, in medicine, surgery and the special departments. The daily sessions are from 10.30 a.m. until 5.30 p.m. Clinical and laboratory methods, etc., are dealt with, demonstrations given on selected cases and formal clinical lectures at 4.30 p.m., to which members of the Fellowship of Medicine are invited. The fee for the course is £5 5s. or £3 3s. for either week.

Copies of the syllabus of the above courses will be forwarded on application to the Fellowship of Medicine.

F.R.C.S. (FINAL) EVENING COURSES.

Two evening courses will be held in preparation for the May examination. Candidates may attend either course, or both courses if they wish.

One course will take place on *Thursdays* on the following dates: March 19, 26, April 16, 23, 30, May 7.

The other course will take place on *Tuesdays* on the following dates: March 24, April 14, 21, 28, May 5, 12. The second course will not be a repetition of the first but will be quite distinct from it. The classes will begin at 8 p.m.

Each demonstrator will provide two cases and the class will be divided into groups, each demonstrator taking each group in turn. The candidates will have the opportunity of examining cases and will be questioned on the diagnosis, pathology and treatment.

The number attending each course will be *strictly limited*. A detailed syllabus giving names of demonstrators, place of instruction, fees, &c., will be issued later.

Post-graduates may enter their names now for either or both of the courses, on application to the Fellowship of Medicine.

Part I of the Diploma Course in Psychological Medicine will begin at the Maudsley Hospital on January 6 next. This course will include Physiology, Physiological Psychology, Biochemistry, Anatomy and Psychology. The fee for Parts I and II is £15 15s., or £10 10s. for Part I separately. For one single series of lectures in Part I the fee is £4 4s. The Fellowship of Medicine is authorized to collect fees, and copies of the syllabus are obtainable on application.

A course of Lectures and Demonstrations (three months) on Clinical Practice and in Hospital Administration will be given at the North Eastern Hospital, St. Ann's Road, Tottenham, by Dr. F. H. Thomson, on Mondays and Wednesdays at 4.45 p.m., and alternate Saturdays at 11 a.m., beginning Monday, January 5. The fee for the course is £4 4s., which should be sent to the Clerk to the Metropolitan Asylums Board, Victoria Embankment, E.C.4.
