

## POST-GRADUATE NEWS.

FIVE Special Courses have been arranged by the Fellowship of Medicine for the month of March.

For those who have but the late afternoon at their disposal, a course of clinical demonstrations upon selected cases will be given in the O.P. Department of the West End Hospital for Nervous Diseases at 5 p.m. from March 2 to March 27. A minimum entry of ten is required for this course. Fee £2 2s.

An afternoon course in Dermatology will be held at the St. John's Hospital from March 2 to March 28 inclusive. This course will consist of instruction in the O.P. Department, and two lectures twice weekly at 5 p.m. Fee £1 1s. For those desiring pathology a course can be arranged for an additional fee of £4 4s.

The first course in Psychological Medicine (to be held under the ægis of the Fellowship of Medicine) at the new Bethlem Royal Hospital, situated at Monks Orchard, Eden Park, Beckenham, will be held on Tuesdays and Saturdays at 11 a.m. from March 3 to March 28. Fee £1 1s.

From March 9 to March 27 a course in Medicine, Surgery and Gynæcology will be held at the Royal Waterloo Hospital for Children and Women. Afternoons and some mornings will be occupied. Fee £3 3s.

An all-day course will be given at the Royal National Orthopædic Hospital from March 9 to 21. A minimum entry of ten is insisted upon, so early application is requested. Fee £3 3s. We would mention that this is the only course to be held in this subject during 1931.

Detailed information relating to all courses, including the "General," consisting of the clinical practice of the hospitals associated with the Fellowship of Medicine, as well as the programmes of lectures and clinical demonstrations, can be obtained from the Secretary of the Fellowship of Medicine.

## M.R.C.P. SPECIAL COURSE.

The dates of the next course arranged by the Fellowship of Medicine have been fixed from Tuesday, May 5, to Friday, June 26, and will consist of a series of lectures given by experts in their own particular branch of medicine. The lectures will be delivered (unless otherwise stated) at the Medical Society of London, 11, Chandos Street, Cavendish Square, W. 1, at 8.30 p.m. The fee for the course is £6 6s. for seventeen lectures, or 10s. 6d. each lecture. Two demonstrations on the eye will be given for which an extra fee of 10s. 6d. each will be charged. It is hoped to issue the detailed syllabus shortly.

Post-graduate Courses in Venereal Diseases (*for women post-graduates only*) will be held in collaboration with the Fellowship of Medicine in the Marlborough (V.D.) Department of the Royal Free Hospital, on the following lines:—

Daily attendance at Clinics for a period of two and a half hours on end is required. Post-graduates will first watch the work of the Out-Patient Department and will later participate in case-taking and treatment; they will take films in cases of gonorrhœa, and will examine them microscopically.

Blood for Wassermann tests will be taken and the technique of W.R. and Kahn tests demonstrated by the V.D. pathologists.

Stress will be laid on the care and treatment of ante-natal cases, and visits to the Marlborough Maternity Wards will show the results of such treatments. Visits will be paid to two hostels in connection with the Department, where V.D. cases are dealt with. One of these is for non-pregnant girls; the other, of about thirty beds, is for pregnant and delivered patients. The Social Service aspect of the work can be seen here, and the various after-care schemes for correlation with other bodies studied.

Two short tutorials weekly will be held, at which different stages of the diseases and their complications will be extensively taught and discussed.

A total attendance of not less than 130 hours of such work entitles the post-graduate to a certificate which the Ministry of Health requires for any practitioner who desires to be in charge of a recognized V.D. Centre.

The course will extend over a period of twelve weeks; will be held for not less than two (and not more than four) post-graduates at a time. Should there be a vacancy, an additional post-graduate may join the course at the beginning of the month. Fee £21.
